**Welcome to the course.** We think you'll enjoy studying the Bachelor of Social Work at QUT because it gives you the flexibility to structure your studies according to your own interests as well as preparing you for a choice of interesting careers.

The social work program at QUT is committed to promoting an inclusive society based on principles of social justice, empowerment and human rights. The program combines course work and field education geared to develop effective and ethically responsible professionals who can apply disciplinary knowledge and theory using a variety of intervention processes. The methods that are learnt apply to everyday practice realities and contexts which enhance the rights, value, wellbeing and dignity of people.

This program has been accredited by the Australian Association of Social Workers (AASW). Graduates are entitled to apply for membership of the AASW.

### *Frequently Used Words*

#### **Units**

Units are the basic components of any QUT course. Each unit has a code and title:

	<b>Unit Code</b>	<b>Unit Title</b>
For example:	HHB116	Applied Skills and Scholarship.

Units are usually taught over one semester (13 weeks) and will involve three to four contact hours per week per unit. You should also allow for approximately eight hours per week of independent study. Units may consist of a weekly lecture in a large theatre plus a smaller weekly tutorial group, a three hour long lecture/tutorial group, or a different combination of classes. All units make considerable use of QUT's virtual platform called Blackboard. You are expected to be very familiar with the material placed on Blackboard.

***You will need to complete the equivalent of 32 units to graduate with the Bachelor of Social Work.***

#### **Credit Points (CP)**

Units are worth credit points. Most units at QUT, including these in the Bachelor of Social Work degree are worth 12 Credit Points. The exception to this is that the two Social Work Practice and Fieldwork units in the course are worth 36 credit points each, equivalent to 3 units each. To obtain the Bachelor of Social Work, students must complete 384 Credit Points (equivalent to 32 units) in total.

#### **Prerequisite**

A specified unit which must be passed prior to the enrolment of another unit. For example, if HHB100 is a prerequisite for HHB338, you must have passed HHB100 prior to enrolling in HHB338.

### **Corequisite**

A specified unit which must be undertaken at the same time as another unit. For example, if HHB338 is a corequisite for HHB339, you should be enrolled in both HHB338 and HHB339 in the same semester.

### **Specified Elective Option**

A specified elective option involves choosing from a given List of units. Following the course structure, you may choose electives from the designated lists to tailor the course to areas which interest you the most e.g. Year 4 Semester One requires you to undertake one Social Work elective option and one Social Work advanced service option. The course also includes a number of pathways. These are combinations of particular suggested units allowing you to develop expertise in a particular area of practice. The pathways available are listed in the Course Structure – see p.5-11.

### **Designated Units**

Field Studies units HHB338 and HHB408 as well as HHB282 Advanced Communication in Human Services and Social Work are 'designated units' which you are required to complete in order to continue with your award course. Student performance in these units is reviewed at the end of each year. Students who do not successfully complete all the requirements of these units will have their progress in the course reviewed. ### **Duration of Study**

Full time students in the Bachelor of Social Work usually enroll in four units per semester with the exception of Year 3 Semester 1 and Year 4 Semester 2 where students enroll in just two units, one of which is Social Work Practice and Fieldwork. Full-time students should expect to complete the course in four years. Refer to p.5-6 for the Course Structure. You may undertake fewer than 4 units per semester, but this is likely to extend the duration of the course.

### **Social Work Professional Practice**

These units provide the opportunity to experience practice in the real world by integrating your theoretical knowledge into the context of the workplace. There are two field education placements and two accompanying theoretical units which process your field education experience. The field education placements are 490 hours each and occur in the third and fourth years of the four year full-time program.

### **Working with Children Check**

As a student who may have to work with children or young people as part of your studies (eg in a field placement) you must obtain a Blue Card BEFORE you begin your placement. A Blue Card confirms that you have passed a screening of your criminal history (the 'Working with Children Check') and have been approved to work with children and young people under 18 years of age. As soon as you accept your offer into the course, you must submit your Blue Card application to the QUT Student Centre. You must hold a Blue Card to undertake placement units (HHB338 and HHB408). If you do not apply for a Blue Card upon acceptance into the course and allow sufficient time for the police check and issuing of the Card, you will be unable to participate in the required activities and may need to be withdrawn from the unit(s) and incur both financial and academic penalty. It may take up to eight weeks for the Commission to issue the Card.

### **Limits on Grades of 3**

A new policy concerning grades of 3 comes into effect from 1 January 2009 ([QUT MOPP C/9.2](#)). With effect from this date grades of 3 will no longer be considered a conceded or low pass but will be classified as a **fail** grade. Any grades of 3 awarded **prior to 1 January 2009** will retain the conceded pass status and will be counted for graduation purposes up to the maximum number of grades of 3 permitted for your course. Grades of 3 incurred after 1 January 2009 will not count towards your degree. For HH05 the number of pre-2009 grades of 3 permitted is 3. Please note any provisional credit (advanced standing) awarded for QUT units undertaken prior to 2009 based on a grade of 3 will be honoured, subject to there being no breach of the maximum number of grades of 3 ruling for the course overall.

### **Class and Location Codes:**

When completing your Enrolment Form you will be required to indicate the class and location codes for each unit that you will be studying:

**Class codes** – INT Unit is taught on campus (most units in the Bachelor of Social Work program have this class code).

**Location codes** – KG Unit is taught on the Kelvin Grove Campus.

## **COURSE STRUCTURE**

The course contains a mix of core required units, specified electives, as well as an unspecified (open) elective. It also contains a number of pathways, or clusters of units, designed to assist you to orient your unit choices to particular vocational and practice outcomes. The pathways available are:

### **Service Pathways**

- Child and family services
- Corrective services
- Disability services
- Services to young people

The service pathway involves an opportunity for you to develop an in-depth appreciation of a particular service area.

A pathway in one of these involves undertaking the Introductory and Advanced units for that service area as well as one field education placement relevant to that area.

### **Additional Pathways**

- **International practice**

The International Practice pathway provides you with the knowledge and opportunity to undertake human service and social work practice in other national contexts. Units included are an International and Global Studies elective, the Community Work skills unit and the International Social Work unit. This pathway culminates in the final field education placement being undertaken overseas – subject to availability.

- **Child protection**

This pathway will best prepare you for practice in child protection settings (eg. the Queensland Department of Child Safety) and includes HHB319 Child Protection Intervention Skills, either the Child and Family Services or Services to Young People service units (one Introductory and one Advanced), and a field placement in a relevant agency – subject to availability.

- **Research**

The research pathway provides you with the knowledge and skills to undertake research in relation to Social Work practice, service development and policy. This pathway involves undertaking three research oriented units including HHB411 Advanced Project. Students seeking to undertake the research pathway will need to apply to the Course Coordinator in semester 1, year 3.

You may, depending on how you structure your course electives, undertake one Service Pathway and one from child protection or international practice or research. You also have the option of spreading your electives more broadly across the range of available units.

## **ADVANCED STANDING (5 semester program)**

Advanced Standing allows students who have completed at least two years of a university degree or equivalent in a relevant area to complete the Social Work course with a further two calendar years of full time study (216 credit points). Relevant areas of previous study are:

Justice Studies

Law

Education

Arts (Humanities)

Social Sciences

Psychology or Behavioural Sciences

Community Welfare and Human Services programs from other universities

Health including Nursing

As part of this prior study, it is expected you will have completed some units with a focus on social studies, behavioural studies, and interpersonal skills. The number of units in addition to the requirements of the standard 2 Year Advanced Standing Program that you can be required to undertake is limited to two (24 credit points).

If your previous study includes no social studies you can be required to undertake one unit with a focus on

- understanding society,

- social disadvantage,
- human rights or
- social/legal processes.

If your previous study includes no behavioural studies you can be required to undertake HHB102 The Human Condition or similar. Further, students undertaking the 2 Year Advanced Standing program may be required to undertake HHB113 Interpersonal Communication if you have not completed a unit with a focus on interpersonal communication.

If you are seeking Advanced Standing you should enroll in the four year Bachelor of Social Work program and apply for advanced standing (up to 168 credit points) regarding your previous study. If you have completed or partly completed a human services degree from QUT you should apply for entry to the four year Bachelor of Social Work program and may receive up to 192 credit points. Advice on likely credit can be provided by the Bachelor of Social Work Course Coordinator. Note, that while these guidelines govern advanced standing arrangements, final outcomes will be decided once formal application has been made.

#### **Advanced Standing Additional Course Requirements**

HHB338 Social Work Practice and Fieldwork 1 and HHB339 Linking Social Work Theory, Ethics and Practice 1 are scheduled outside of semester (during the Summer teaching period) and you will need to be available at that time in order to complete these units.

In undertaking the 2 Year Advanced Standing course structure you undertake your first field placement in the summer semester of the first year following two semesters of preparatory units. Those who enter the program in mid-year will undertake their first field placement in the summer following their first semester.
